SECTION III: REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS

All students must attend the school in the district where their parents/legal guardians reside unless they have an approved assignment to another school or program (e.g., School Choice). Applications for School Choice may be obtained by visiting the Pasco County School: Educational Options website. Completed applications must be submitted during specified application periods.

The school district expects residence information submitted regarding students to be truthful and accurate and district forms pertaining to residence and household membership shall be verified under penalties of perjury.

Section §837.06, Florida Statutes, provides that, "Whoever knowingly makes a false statement in writing with the intent to mislead a public servant in the performance of his or her official duty shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of the second degree." Additionally, a person who knowingly makes a false declaration under penalties of perjury commits a felony of the third degree, pursuant to section 92.525, Florida Statutes. Providing school officials false information regarding your residence when enrolling your child may result in your child being withdrawn and/or reassigned to the appropriate zoned school and referral of the matter to law enforcement for possible criminal prosecution. Additionally, falsification of this information may result in the permanent revocation of your child's privilege to engage in extracurricular activities, including organized sports.

Parents/legal guardians are responsible for notifying the school principal if there is a change in residence or parental responsibility of the student within five (5) days even if the parent thinks the student is still in the school's zone. Failure to give timely notice may result in a reassignment to the student's zoned school and/or loss of eligibility for athletics and other activities.





Cub Dress Code

To view the entire Pasco County School Dress Code, please visit our Cypress Website: CES.pasco.k12.fl.us > School Information tab. The most common dress code issues seen in the elementary setting are:

- ❖ Hats and hoodies are not to be worn inside the building unless it is for religious/medical reasons.
- ❖ Shoes. To participate in PE AND RECESS, students need to have shoes with backs and closed toe. Students with sandals will need to sit out of PE and recess. In the elementary setting, flip flops are not appropriate footwear. All shoes should have back support. If you need support please reach out to Lisa Jones at 727-774-4509.
- A Pants/shorts should not have holes or rips, and should be worn securely at the waist.
- Shorts/skirts should be long enough to reach fingertips or 4 inches above the knee. ****At the elementary level, we understand children are growing quickly, and keeping to the fingertip guideline would be difficult. We respectfully ask parents to monitor the length of shorts to help ensure an appropriate length, the entire day without needing to pull them down after sitting down.
- Shirts should be long enough to overlap the waistband without exposing skin during the school day.
- ❖ Shirt necklines should not fall lower than drawing an imaginary line between both armpits.
- Straps should be 2 adult fingers wide, over the shoulder. Backless and strapless clothing may not be worn at school.



NOTIFICATION OF INSPECTION FOR ASBESTOS CONTAINING MATERIALS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

\$30, if the face value exceeds \$50 but does not exceed \$300;



The child may have unexplained:

- bruises, welts, cuts or other injuries
- broken bones
- o lourns

A child experiencing physical abuse may:

- seem withdrawn or depressed
- seem afraid to go home or may run away
- shy away from physical contact
- be aggressive
- wear inappropriate clothing to hide injuries.

Signs of Sexual Abuse

- The child may have:
 torn, stained or bloody underwear
- trouble walking or sitting
- pain or itching in genital area
- a sexually transmitted disease

A child experiencing sexual abuse may:

- have unusual knowledge of sex or act seductively - fear a particular person
- seem withdrawn or depressed
- gain or lose weight suddenly
- shy away from physical contact.
- run away from home

Signs of Negletin

The child may have:

- unattended medical needs
- little or no supervision at home
- poor hygiene
- appear underweight

A child experiencing neglect may:

- be frequently tired or hungry
- steal food
- appear overly needy for adult attention

Serious abuse usually involves a combination of factors. While a single sign may not be significant, a pattern of physical or behavioral signs is a serious indicator and should be reported.

Show that you understand and believe what the child tells you. Encourage, but don't pressure him/her to talk. Ask open ended questions.

Tell the child he/she did the right thing by coming to you. Stress that he/she is not to blame. Let the child know that you want to help.

This can frighten the child or prevent him/her from telling you more. Do not talk negitively about the suspected abuser in front or the child.

Pagent Cit Document your conversation as soon as you can. If possible, write down the child's exact words.





The right of a student to participate fully in classroom and extracurricular activities shall not be abridged or impaired because of age, race, color, religion, gender, ethnicity, national origin, disability, pregnancy, parenthood, marriage, political beliefs, social and family background, or any other reason not related to his/her individual capabilities.

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Communication: We communicate with parents, families, and the community in a variety of ways: teacher/monthly school newsletters; parent conferences; student planners/folders; automated phone system; backpack fliers; email; myStudent Communication App; Cypress Webpage; Electronic Backpack; and social media. We encourage parents to consistently communicate with your child's teacher(s) and the school.

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Student Dismissal

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Buses: Students who are transported to and from school by bus must board and leave the bus at their assigned stop only. Students will not be permitted to ride a bus other than their own. Buses are provided for transportation of children between home/daycare center and school only. Cypress emphasizes safe bus riding practices and follows the rules and consequences outlined in the Student Code of Conduct. **Transportation Call Center: 727-774-2500**

Car Riders: Car riders are to be registered in the front office by the parent/guardian. A name card will be issued to display in your windshield. Only persons authorized by parent/guardian and those who have a card for their windshield will be allowed to pick-up students. Students must be dropped off and picked up in the south parking loop. Parents are asked to wait in their cars forming an orderly line. Parents should never pass in the car loop or on Sweet Bay Court while waiting for the line to move. Students should not be left unattended or dropped off at school early, unless for a scheduled event.

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Early Warning System: The District has developed a system of collecting and reviewing academic, attendance and behavior data to ensure students are "ON TRACK". Cypress Elementary will celebrate students who are On Track on a quarterly basis.

Please remember that anytime you come on campus, we ask that you bring your identification into the school for EVERY visit.

Cypress Elementary Mission Statement: Cypress Elementary is a learning partnership dedicated to encouraging high achievement and lifelong learners.

Cypress Core Beliefs: At Cypress Elementary, we believe that teachers make a critical difference in motivating and inspiring students for success; positive visions and collaboration are essential for success; all children have talents, skills and unique abilities.

Cypress Elementary Commitments: At Cypress Elementary, we are committed to the following best practices: rigorous instruction; collaborative planning time for grade levels; differentiating instruction and assessments based on student needs; conferencing with students about their progress; writing across the curriculum.

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Student Code of Conduct: The District School Board of Pasco County has adopted the Code of Student Conduct as the official guidelines for student rights, responsibilities, rules for student conduct, interventions, rules for school attendance, rules for dress and appearance, and school bus rules. Every student will receive a copy of this document. Please take the time to go over the document with your child. Parents and students are required to provide documentation acknowledging they have reviewed and will abide by the DSBPC Student Code of Conduct on a yearly basis.

Clinic: The school clinic serves as a temporary resting place for sick children and for the administration of medications and First Aid for minor injuries. Parents will be called to pick-up children if they are unable to return to class.

Student Illness: If a student is sent home with a temperature over 100 degrees, vomiting or diarrhea, they must be fever/symptom-free for 24 hours, without the use of medication, before returning to school. Students with a communicable illness will need a doctor's note stating they have received treatment to return to school. In certain circumstances the District may decide, with guidance from the Florida Department of Health, to temporarily change these protocols if there is a high risk for infection. Parents would be notified in advanced, if this were to occur.

Head Lice: If a child is suspected to have lice, they will be checked in a private setting by the clinic assistant or school nurse. If lice are found on a student, the parent will be notified and the student must be treated at home. Students are not required to be sent home with live lice. Parents should check their children at home for nits and live lice on a regular basis. Please contact the Health Assistant for suggestions on the appropriate actions to take for treatment and control of infestation.

Medications: All medications, both prescription and over-the-counter, must be submitted IN PERSON by a parent or legal guardian, to the Health Assistant. All medications must be taken under supervision. No medication will be dispensed unless it is in the original package. All medications must show dosage, physician's name, student's name, time to be administered, and current date. This includes over the counter medications, such as cough drops, Chapstick, etc. Parents must also complete an authorization form.

Crutches, canes, walkers, splints, wraps and casts: If a student is requiring the use of any of these items, a doctor's note is required so all medical orders can be followed appropriately at school.

No PE Notes: Only a note from a physician is accepted for limited participation or restrictions for PE/recess.

Conferences: Parents are encouraged to conference with their child's teacher regarding educational progress. Please feel free to contact your child's teacher and make an appointment.

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Instructional Program: Instructional programs are planned in an endeavor to meet the needs of every child, to encourage the child to work up to his/her full potential, and to promote development of self-discipline, a sense of responsibility, and respect for self, others, school, and school property. Cypress also serves students found eligible for Special Education Programs.

Student Records: Student records may be reviewed upon parent request. Please give advance notice in order for an administrator to be present.

Technology: iPads and computers are available in the classrooms. Internet access is provided and supervised for instructional purposes. Students must follow Pasco County School Board network use guidelines. Students who use technology inappropriately may have their computer privileges suspended or revoked.

Video-Taping/Photographing of Students: At times, we may sponsor special activities for our students. On these occasions, your child may be photographed or recorded. These images may be used on our school website, our school news program, or may be available to the public via the newspaper, internet or television broadcasts. Parents are required to complete the Media Consent section of the Parent Portal each school year.

Parties: Class or school parties with food are kept to a minimum. Birthday parties during the school day will not occur. Please confer with the classroom teacher before bringing treats to We encourage birthday treats be purchased through the school cafeteria.

PTO: Cypress Elementary has a <u>very</u> active Parent-Teacher Organization. All parents are invited to join and to attend the monthly PTO meetings.

Textbooks: Books issued to the students are the responsibility of the student. If books are lost or damaged, the student must pay for the damaged or lost book. Normal wear and tear will not be assessed.

Valuables: Students should not bring unnecessary money or possessions. Games and toys will be removed from students unless specifically allowed for a special event. The school is not responsible for lost, damaged or stolen items.

Adopt-A-Class: Adopt-A-Class is a program designed to foster a partnership between a local business or family and a class at Cypress Elementary. A business makes a tax-deductible donation of \$150.00 or Family for \$100.00 to the school and 100% of the money goes directly to a designated classroom or department to purchase items selected by the teacher. Why is it so important to focus on teaching positive social behaviors?

In the past, school-wide discipline has focused mainly on reacting to specific student misbehavior by implementing punishment-based strategies including reprimands, loss of privileges, office referral, suspension, and expulsion.

Research has shown that the implementation of punishment, especially when it is used inconsistently and in the absence of other positive strategies, is ineffective. Introducing, modeling, and reinforcing positive social behavior are an important piece of a student's educational experience.

Teaching behavioral expectations and rewarding students for following them is a much more positive approach than waiting for misbehavior to occur before responding. The purpose of the school-wide Positive Behavior Support System is to establish a climate in which appropriate behavior is the norm.

What is my role as a parent?

Learn about our three school expectations.


At the end of each day, ask your child what positive behavior they did to earn a cub ticket.

Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

What is PBIS all about? (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports)

creating an environment where positive behavior is more effective than problem behavior. PBIS develops interventions to help increase the positive behaviors. This process focuses on prevention and helps to teach and reinforce appropriate behavior choices.
